
1 SAMUEL 8 vs 1



In the 350 years of the judges before this book; years characterize by the phrase: and the children of Israel did evil in the sight of the Lord. Obviously, the Lord said enough and sent Samuel, who was the last judge; a good judge, who moved in the power of the Spirit. This first book of Samuel, focuses on 3 principle people: Samuel, from his birth to his death, Saul, the first king – the people's choice, and David, the blessed king, the Lord's choice.

Samuel's warning to Israel who demanded a king,



- ¹ And it happened, when Samuel was old, that he made his sons judges over Israel.
- ² Now the name of his firstborn was Joel; and the name of his second, Abiah: they were judges in Beersheba.
- ³ And his sons did not walk in his ways, but turned aside after money, and took bribes, and perverted justice.
- ⁴ Then all the elders of Israel gathered themselves together, and came to Samuel to Ramah,
- ⁵ and said to him, Behold, you are old, and your sons do not walk in your ways: now appoint a king for us to judge us like all the nations.
- ⁶ But the idea displeased Samuel, when they said, Give us a king to judge us. And Samuel prayed to the LORD.
- ⁷ And the LORD said to Samuel, Listen to the voice of the people in all they say to you: for they have not rejected you,

but they have rejected Me, that I am not to reign over them.

- ⁸ Like all the deeds they have done since the day I brought them up from Egypt even to this day, in that they have forsaken Me, and served other gods -- so they are doing also to you.
- ⁹ So now listen to their voice: however solemnly warn them, and show them the manner of how the king will reign over them.
- ¹⁰ So Samuel spoke all the words of the LORD to the people who asked of him a king.
- ¹¹ And he said, This will be the manner of the king who will reign over you: He will take your sons, and place them for himself, in his chariots, and among his horsemen; and some will run before his chariots.

¹² And he will appoint him captains of thousands, and captains of fifties; and some to plow his ground, and to reap his harvest, and to make his weapons of war, and equipment for his chariots.

¹³ And he will take your daughters for perfumers, and cooks and bakers.

 14 And he will take the best of your fields, and your vineyards, and your olive groves, and give them to his servants.

 15 And he will take a tenth of your seed, and of your vineyards, and give to his officers, and to his servants.

 16 And he will take your male servants, and your female servants, and your best young men, and your asses, and use them for his work.

¹⁷ He will take a tenth of your flocks: and you will become his servants.

¹⁸ Then, in that day you will cry out because of your king whom you have chosen for yourself; but the LORD will not answer you in that day.

 19 Nevertheless the people refused to obey the voice of Samuel; and they said, No; but we will have a king over us;

 20 that we also may be like all the nations; and that our king may judge us, and go out before us, and fight our battles.

 21 Now after Samuel heard all the words of the people, he repeated them in the LORD'S hearing.

²² And the LORD said to Samuel, Listen to their voice, and appoint them a king. So Samuel said to the men of Israel: Go, every man to his city.
