

EXODUS 2 vs 1



This chapter begins the story of Moses, that man of renown, famed for his intimate acquaintance with Heaven and his eminent usefulness on earth, and the most remarkable type of Christ as a prophet, savior, lawgiver, and mediator in all the Old Testament. In this chapter we have the perils of his birth and infancy; what he recorded here, we may rely on to the dawning of the day of Israel's deliverance -- Matthew Henry.

- ¹ And there went a man of the house of Levi, and took to wife a daughter of Levi.
- ² And the woman conceived, and bare a son: and when she saw that he was a beautiful child, she hid him for three months.
- ³ And when she could no longer hide him, she got a wicker basket of bulrushes, and daubed it with tar and with pitch, and put the child in it; and she laid it in the reeds by the river's bank.
- ⁴And his sister stood afar off, to know what would happen to him.
- ⁵ And the daughter of Pharaoh came down to bathe at the river with her maidens walking along the riverside; and when she saw the basket among the reeds, she sent her maid to get it.






⁸ And Pharaoh's daughter said to her, Go.

¹⁵ Now when Pharaoh heard this matter, he sought to kill Moses.


Midian in Arabia,

²¹ And Moses was content to dwell with the man:

and he gave his daughter Zipporah to Moses.

²² And she bare him a son, and he called his name Gershom: for he said, I have been a sojourner in a foreign land.

²³ And it happened in time, that the king of Egypt died.

And the children of **Israel** sighed because of their bondage, and they cried out, and their cry for help by reason of their bondage rose up to God.

 24 And God heard their groaning, and God remembered his covenant with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

²⁵ And God saw the children of **Israel**, and God took notice of them.

The frequent repetition of the name of God here intimates that now we are to expect something great, Opus Deo dignum – A work worthy of God. His eyes, which run to and fro through the earth, are now fixed upon Israel, to show himself strong, to show himself a God in their behalf – Matthew Henry.
