

<sup>1</sup> Moreover He said to me, Son of man, consume what you find; consume this scroll,

and go speak to the house of Israel / isn't that phrase interesting? How come we never think Ezekiel is to look for a building of brick or stone? It is the context, right? In Hebrew, bayit is first used when the Lord said to Noah, Come, you and all your house into the Ark -- Genesis 7:1... and nobody has the impression Noah started ripping down his chimney and kitchen, bedroom and bath... and hauling it off to where the Ark was situated. So, when we read the house of the Lord... why do we always assume we are directed to look for a building, especially in the future time of Messiah?



Early in his book, Isaiah tells us about when many will say: Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the household of the God of Jacob... and He will teach us of his ways -- Isaiah 2:3. Isaiah is talking about people; not buildings. Later he says more about this place: there will be a TENT - a temporary shelter for shade in the daytime from the heat of the day; and from the storm and rain -- Isaiah 4:6.

Isn't the Bible interesting when we read it? Zechariah repeatedly tells us Messiah will build something in that same place **when He comes** again -- Zech. 6:12,13. Isaiah says; **a TENT**. But back to Ezekiel...

and go speak to the household of Israel = the household of the God of Jacob.

<sup>2</sup> So I opened my mouth, and He caused me to consume that scroll.

<sup>3</sup> He said to me, Son of man, cause your belly to eat, and fill your guts / clearly... Son of man, swallow and digest this scroll I give you.

When I consumed it; it tasted sweet as honey in my mouth / so we know it was the Word of the LORD... because Ezekiel had the exact same response to it as Jeremiah and the great king David and all the others – it's delicious!

<sup>4</sup> And He said to me, Son of man, go to the household of Israel,

and speak My words to them / which is the assignment of any good and faithful prophet or pastor... they always speak the Word of God; not their genius mumbo jumbo or creative hocus pocus.

- <sup>5</sup> For it is not sent to people with a foreign speech and a difficult language, but to the house of Israel / consistently the highest educated group of people in the world still today... the Word is in their vernacular, it is no kabalistic or cryptic dialect;
- <sup>6</sup> It is not to people of a foreign / strange speech or of a difficult language, whose words you cannot understand.



I send you to them, they will listen to you / apparently, even the Lord GoD is hopeful that Ezekiel's skillful delivery will grab their attention.

<sup>7</sup> But the household of Israel will not listen to you; for they will not listen to Me / in other words, God is realistic enough to let Ezekiel know who He has been dealing with all these years... and that the prophet might not expect any better results:

**for all the household of Israel** are impudent and hardhearted / like immature children -- defiant and stubborn... who most likely will have a tantrum when they hear what Ezekiel is sent to say.

<sup>8</sup> Behold, I have made your face as hard as their faces, and your forehead as hard as their foreheads / Ezekiel's temperament will be sufficient to match whoever he encounters and butts head with.

<sup>9</sup> Like a hard stone harder than flint, I made your forehead: do not fear them, do not be dismayed at their scowls, for they are a rebellious household.

<sup>10</sup> Moreover, He said to me, Son of man,

take to heart all My words that I speak to you, and hear with your ears / in other words, Ezekiel, I've given you both a heart and ears, use them and treasure what I tell you!

<sup>11</sup> Go to them of the captivity / those in exile,

to the children of your people, and speak to them; and say to them,

The Lord God says this / x, y & z; it seems we don't really hear in detail what Ezekiel told them...

whether they listen, whether they refuse to stop.

<sup>12</sup> Then the Spirit picked me up

and I heard a great rumbling sound / like an earthquake... behind me, saying,

Blessed be the glory of the LORD from his place.

<sup>13</sup> I heard also the noise of the wings of the living creatures that touched one another,

and the noise of the wheels over against them, and a noise of a great earthquake / again in this horror... the prophet is given a unique experience as he is transported to some place in preparation for him to deal with the obstinate, spoiled brats of Israel.

<sup>14</sup> So the Spirit picked me up, and carried me away,

and I went away hot and bitter in my spirit; but the hand of the LORD was strong upon me.



<sup>15</sup> Then I came to the exiled who dwell at Tel-abib by the river of Chebar, and there I sat among them, and remained there seven days / a town south of Babylon, from this name we get the name of the modern capital Tel Aviv.

<sup>16</sup> And at the end of seven days, the word of the LORD came to me, saying,

<sup>17</sup> Son of man, I have made you a watchman / a security guard... one who stays awake and alert

#### to the household of Israel:

when you hear a word from My mouth, warn them from Me.

<sup>18</sup> When I tell the wrong, you must surely die; and you do not warn him, if you say nothing to warn the wrong from his wrong way in order to save his life;

then that wrong man will die for his iniquity; but his blood I will require at your hand / God would hold the watchman responsible for his death.

<sup>19</sup> Yet if you do warn the wrong, and he turns not from his wrongness, nor from his wrong way,

then he will die in his iniquity; but you have saved yourself.

<sup>20</sup> Again, when a right man turns from his rightness to commit iniquity, and I put a stumbling-block before him, then he will die: since you have not given him warning;

he will die in his sin, and any rightness which he has done will not be remembered;

but I will hold you responsible for his death.

<sup>21</sup> Yet if you warn a right man, that the right should not sin... and he does not sin, he will surely live,

since he is warned; and you have saved yourself.

<sup>22</sup> The hand of the LORD was upon me; and He said to me,

Arise, go out to the plain, there... I will talk with you.

<sup>23</sup> Then I arose, and went to the plain: and, behold, the glory of the LORD stood there,

like the glory which I saw by the river of Chebar:

and I fell on my face.



<sup>24</sup> Then the Spirit entered me, and set me on my feet,

and spoke with me, and said to me / the Spirit of the Lord doesn't leave us hanging in confusion; listen and do what He says,

Go, shut yourself inside your house.

<sup>25</sup>O son of man, behold, you will be tied and bound, so you cannot go out among them:

<sup>26</sup> Moreover, I will make your tongue stick to the roof of your mouth, so you cannot speak, and you will not censure them: for they are a rebellious house.

<sup>27</sup> But when I speak to you,

I will open your mouth,

and you will say to them / in other words, the LORD will do everything leading up to the grand moment; then it would be Ezekiel's time to speak:

The Lord GOD says this / x, y & z;

He who hears, let him hear;

he who refuses to stop, let him refuse:

for they are a rebellious household. Ezekiel learns, either they will listen or they will refuse to listen... and the Lord GoD will know how to sort out who is friend or foe.

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
