JOB 39 vs 1



Little is known about the man who names this book, but a few things we do know, beginning with Job was a real person (mentioned in Ezekiel 14; and James 5). Some scholars suggest this is merely an allegory or possibly an ancient; either way it mentions things that were more clearly understood in the 20th century. Whoever Job was, he knew celestial things; he know terrestrial things; even things that suggest he lived concurrent to massive dinosaurs. The detailed conversations throughout this book, suggest real speeches inscribed shortly after the event, rather than what any poetic artist would write.



Next, the LORD confronts Job with the mysteries of the animal kingdom,

- 1 Do you know the time when the wild mountain goats give birth? or do you observe the calving of the dear?
- ² Can you count the months they fulfil? or do you know the time they give birth?
- ³ They kneel down; they give birth to their young, they cast away their labor pains.
- ⁴ Their offspring become strong, they grow up in the field; they leave, and do not return.
- ⁵ Who sent out the wild ass free? and who loosed the bonds of the swift ass,
- ⁶ to whom I gave the wilderness for a home, and the barren land its dwelling.
- ⁷ He scorns the tumult of the city, the shouting of the driver he does not hear.
- ⁸ He explores the mountains for his pasture, and he searches after every green thing.
- ⁹ Will the unicorn / the rhinoceros be willing to serve you, or spend the night at your manger?
- ¹⁰ Can you bind the rhinoceros in the furrow with ropes? will he plow the valleys after you?
- ¹¹ Will you trust him, because his strength is great, and leave your labor to him?
- ¹² Will you have faith in him, that he will return your grain, and gather it from your barn?
- ¹³ The ostriches' wings flap joyously, with pinions and plumage of love.
- ¹⁴ For she abandons her eggs in the earth, and warms them in the dust,
- ¹⁵ and she forgets that the foot may crush them, or that the wild beast may trample them.

- ¹⁶ She treats her young cruelly, as if they were not hers: her labor is in vain without concern;
- ¹⁷ because God has made her forget wisdom, and has not given to her understanding.
- ¹⁸ When she lifts herself on high, she scorns the horse and his rider.
- ¹⁹ Do you give the horse his strength? Do you clothed his neck with thunder?
- ²⁰ Do you make him leap like a grasshopper? His majestic snorting is terrifying.
- ²¹ He paws in the valley, and rejoices in his strength: he goes out to meet the warriors.
- ²² He laughs at fear, and is not dismayed; nor does he retreat from the sword.
- ²³ The quiver rattles against him, the flashing spear and javelin.
- ²⁴ With fierceness and rage he races over the battlefield: he does not stand still at the sound of the trumpet.
- ²⁵ He says with the trumpets, Ha, ha; and he scents the battle in the distance, the thunder of the captains, and the war cry.
- ²⁶ Does the hawk fly by your wisdom, stretching its wings toward the south?
- ²⁷ Does the eagle mount up at your instruction, and make its nest on high?
- $^{\rm 28}$ dwelling and lodging on the cliff, on the rocky crag, in an isolated fortress.
- 29 From there she spies out the prey; her eyes see it afar off.
- ³⁰ Her young ones also suck up blood: and where the slain are, she is there.
